GARDEN **SPOTLIGHT**

Botanical Name: Sarcococca hookeriana var. humilis

Common Name: sweetbox ·Height: 18"-24"

- Spread: spreads by stolons to slowly cover an area as allowed
- Flower: small, fragrant offwhite blooms in winter to early spring
- Site: Part shade to shade. Prefers moist, well-drained soil but can handle dry shade.
- Leaf: Simple, alternate, oblong to lanceolate, lustrous dark green, evergreen

Sarcococca is among the best when searching for an evergreen groundcover. Leaves maintain a nice, dark green appearance throughout the year as it slowly covers the ground around it. A great plant for small spaces, it provides excellent late winter fragrance that is easily noticed when in the area. One of the many fragrant winter blooming plants, it should be high on the list for those shady outdoor spaces that receive year round use. Great addition to the front of the border.

NEW TREE HOUSE AT GATEWAY GARDENS

One area for future development at Gateway Gardens is the White Oak Forest. Plans for this area have included raised structures to be built amid existing canopy trees. One "tree house" is under construction and will surround three trees and include a deck, a partial roof, steps, and a ramp to meet ADA standards.

Greensboro Beautiful's 2019 NeighborWoods Community Tree Planting was held in the Kings Forest Park and Neighborhood. This neighborhood suffered massive losses to its tree canopy in April 2018 when an EF-2 tornado cut a path of destruction through the area, downing and damaging trees, and devastating the neighborhood park. On November 2, nearly 300 volunteers planted 166 trees in the park and on requesting private properties as street trees. Volunteers included schools, scout troops, churches, universities, community organizations, families,



and individuals. Program partners included the City of Greensboro, the NC Cooperative Extension Master Gardeners, NC811, and Dunlap Tree Service. Funding for the project was provided in part by generous grants from the UPS Foundation, and Keep America Beautiful's Community Restoration and Resiliency Fund.



Greensboro Beautiful presented this annual art event on October 6. It featured 47 artists from throughout the region, three stages of live music and dance performances, interactive art activities for kids, Art Bark art activity for dogs, nature and gardening exhibits, a honey bee exhibit, two food courts, Garden Quest, and beer and wine for sale. Nearly 5,000 were in attendance.


